The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act (The Healthy H2O Act)

Legislation that would provide direct assistance to rural communities, households, and non-profits to test their drinking water and fund filtration technology to provide safer drinking water.

The Problem: Untreated health contaminants threaten water quality for millions of people. Across the United States, communities face threats to their drinking water from a number of contaminants, including lead, arsenic, nitrates, volatile organic compounds (VOCs), PFOA, PFOS, hexavalent chromium-6, and others. Public water systems monitor for these threats and treat water before it is distributed to points of consumption. However, nearly 23 million households rely exclusively on groundwater delivered through private wells for their drinking water. This water is not subject to the same regular oversight and testing for contamination, which can delay the identification of and response to health threats. Children are especially vulnerable to water contaminants such as lead and PFAS, and water filtration systems can often provide relief for families upon installation.

<u>The Solution:</u> The Healthy Drinking Water Affordability Act or "Healthy H2O Act" would drive positive public health benefits for millions of rural, underserved communities (populations of 10,000 or less), with persistent water challenges that lack near-term solutions to contamination by:

- ➤ Providing grants to conduct water quality testing and the purchase, installation, and maintenance of point-of-use or point-of-entry water treatment systems that remove or reduce health-based contaminants from drinking water.
- ➤ Having the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) directly provide grants to individuals, licensed child-care facilities, and non-profits who are equipped to help people go through the process of testing and then finding and installing a water treatment product to address their situation.
- Requiring water treatment systems funded through the program be third-party certified to address the health-based contaminant found in their drinking water.

<u>Bill History:</u> The bipartisan Healthy H2O Act (<u>H.R. 4271/S.2436</u>) was re-introduced in the 119th Congress in July 2025. An identical version of the bill was introduced in the 118th Congress (<u>H.R. 1721/S. 806</u>) and was cosponsored by 50 members of the House and Senate. Due to its extensive support, the bill was included in both 2024 Senate Farm Bill frameworks, while a modified text was included in the House Farm Bill – the Farm, Food, and National Security Act of 2024 (<u>H.R. 8467</u>).
